# ESPIONAGE INDICATORS



## Clues to watch for:

**Attempts to obtain witness signatures on classified document or crypto destruction forms when the witness did not observe the destruction**

- Spied for Russian KGB from 1967 until 1985. One of the most damaging spy rings in US History
- Forged destruction records for highly sensitive US Navy cryptographic codes. Secretly provided the codes to the KGB allowing Russia to decipher US classified messages for many years
- KGB comment: *"Walker was the greatest case in KGB history. We deciphered millions of your messages. If there had been a war, we would have won it"*
- Convinced his brother, his son and his friend, to spy for him
- Its cost the US taxpayer an estimated one billion dollars to repair the damage the "Walker Spy Ring" had done
- Ex-wife turned him in to FBI. All received a life sentence except for Michael Walker who received a 25 year sentence

## Retired Navy man accused of spying

### Walker's life reflected cloak-and-dagger image

NORFOLK — He favored fancy weaponry like crossbows and knife-ejecting canes, an acquaintance said. A neighbor recalled that he liked to disguise himself, appearing once as a priest and another time as a hobo.

He piloted his own airplane and once told a writer that his vocation was "damn glamorous work."

He was, by numerous accounts, living a kind of James Bond fantasy life.

But Monday, John Anthony Walker Jr., 47, the owner of two Virginia Beach private investigative agencies, found himself caught up in his own cloak-and-dagger intrigue. Federal agents arrested him at a Rockville, Md., Ramada Inn, and charged him with attempting to supply 129 classified Navy documents to the Soviet Union.

Walker, a retired Navy warrant officer who specialized in naval communications, owns Confidential Reports and Elec-

tronic Counter-Spy, both in the Kempsville Professional Building in the 400 block of South Parliament Drive in Virginia Beach.

Engaged in "debugging" activities — the locating of secret electronic listening devices — Walker's businesses apparently served a number of corporate and private clients, from one of the area's largest shipyards to parents trying to locate lost children.

"You've got to give the devil his due," said one man familiar with Walker's activities as a private investigator. "He knew electronics. And anyone who has the ability and education to debug a place certainly knows how to bug it too."

Another man who knows of Walker's business activities said that Walker "liked to sting people. When he finally gets people, he's over-ecstatic."

Walker's military training apparently provided ample experience for his later electronic sur-

A Norfolk private detective, retired from the Navy with a top-secret security clearance, was arrested Monday morning by FBI agents outside a motel in Rockville, Md., and accused of spying for the Soviet Union.

Authorities said that John Anthony Walker Jr., 47, of 8524 Old Ocean View Road may have been supplying the Soviets with information for 15 to 18 years. He was jailed in Baltimore and held without bail on a charge of espionage.

Documents recovered by the FBI on Sunday appear to have come from the Norfolk-based nuclear carrier Nimitz. Walker's 22-year-old son is a yeoman stationed aboard the ship, the FBI said.

The son, Michael Lance Walker, reportedly was being questioned Monday night in Port Haifa, Israel, where the Nimitz had docked after completing an exercise.

FBI agents Sunday night followed John A. Walker from his Euwanee Park home to a wooded area near Pooleville in Montgomery County, Md., where, authorities said, he dropped off a package containing 129 secret Navy documents.

Some of the documents concerned the deployment and movements of Soviet navy and merchant ships in the Mediterranean, the FBI says in a court affidavit.

A letter discovered inside alluded

to earlier deliveries of similar materials and complained that too much film was being used to reproduce the volume of documents, the FBI said.

Agents said a Soviet official was later seen in the drop area.

FBI agents staked out the Ramada Inn in Rockville, Md., on Monday morning and arrested Walker in a hallway near the elevator, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Michael Schatzow, who was the prosecutor at Walker's bond hearing Monday in U.S. District Court in Baltimore.

Walker held a handgun on the agents for a few seconds before dropping it without firing, Schatzow said.

"When they called to him, he spun on them and he had a revolver in his hand," Schatzow said. "He pointed it at them, and they told him to drop it several times before he did."

Schatzow said that Norfolk-based FBI Special Agent Robert Hunter testified at the hearing that two confidential informants, who had passed lie detector tests, told the FBI that Walker had been supplying the Soviet Union with information for 15 to 18 years. That would include part of his Navy career.

Walker is being held in Baltimore City Jail. A preliminary hearing has been scheduled for May 29.

The maximum penalty for spying in peacetime is life in prison.

As Walker drove his car from Norfolk to Maryland on Sunday night, he seemed to be trying to elude or detect any surveillance, the affidavit

says.

The FBI agents were apparently undetected and watched Walker drive to a wooded area about 8:30 p.m. and stop his car near a tree with a "No Hunting" sign.

Agents searched the area after Walker left. They found a paper shopping bag near the tree, the affi-

davit says. The bag contained pieces of trash and a sealed manila envelope in which was a plastic bag holding Navy communications "classified as secret and confidential," the affidavit says.

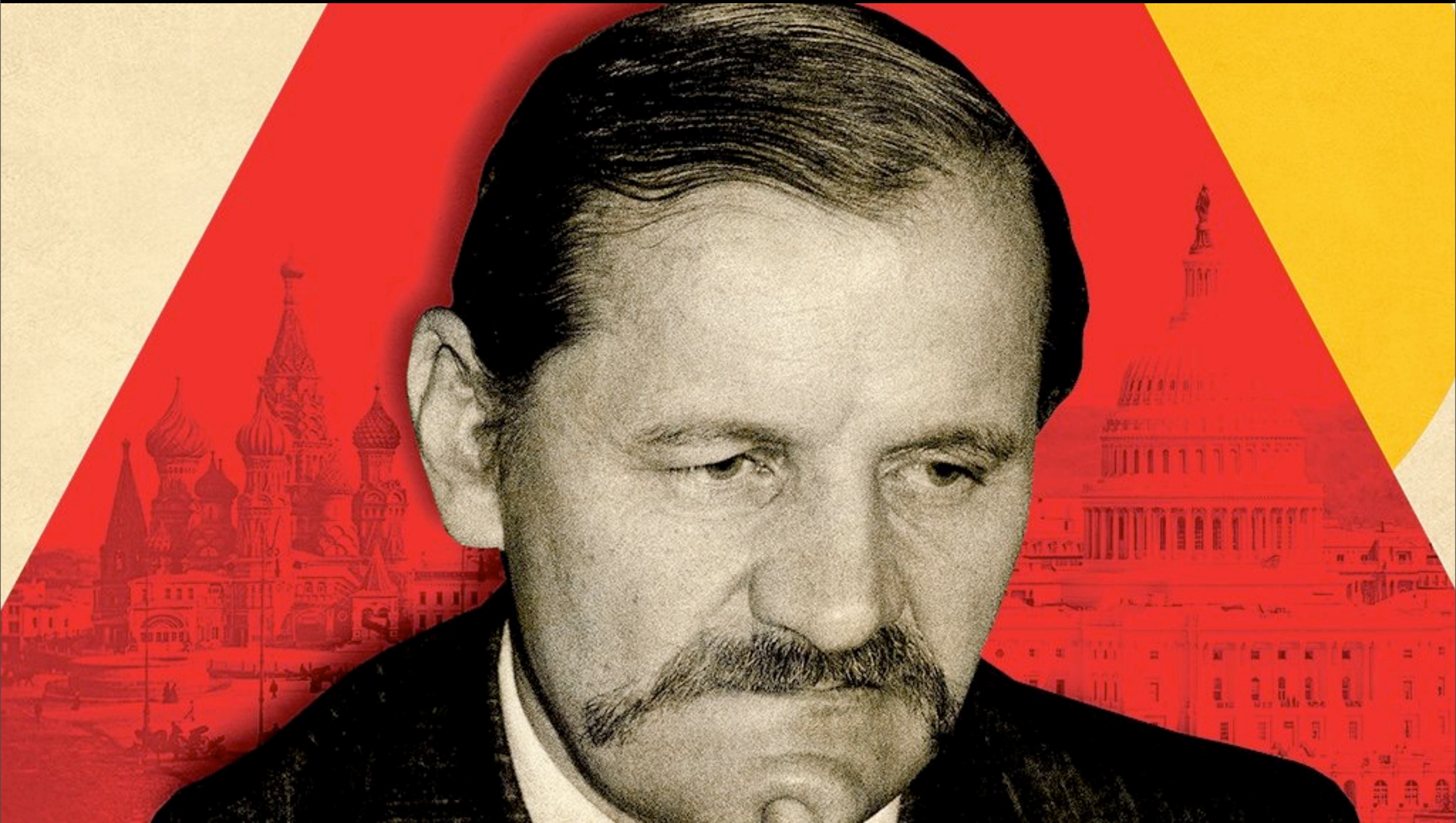

# THE SPY WHO GOT AWAY

Edward Lee Howard was a C.I.A. recruit bound for Moscow. Dismissed, he eluded the F.B.I., defected and left U.S. intelligence efforts compromised. Now it has been learned that another ex-C.I.A. agent was aware of the betrayal.

IN THE SILENCE JUST BEFORE TWILIGHT in the desert near Santa Fe, the sky changes colors, shading to pinks and reds, and the sunset casts an orange glow on the golden-sagebrush, the prickly pear cactuses and the juniper trees. The Sangre de Cristo mountains turn purple, then swiftly black. Suddenly, the first stars appear and the night belongs to the coyotes, the chirping owls and the owls.

On just such a night a little more than a year ago, with the clouds racing past a quarter-moon, Edward Lee Howard, a 33-year-old former officer of the Central Intelligence Agency, slipped away from agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and vanished.

On Aug. 7 of this year, he surfaced in Moscow, granted political asylum by the Russians. According to intelligence officials, Howard betrayed the methods used by the C.I.A. to contact its spies — "assets" in intelligence jargon — in the Soviet Union, leading directly to the arrest of one such C.I.A. asset, Soviet defense researcher Adolf G. Tolkachev, whose execution was announced a week and a half ago by Tass, the Soviet news agency. Howard's information also may have led to the ex-

# How the F.B.I. Finally Caught Aldrich Ames

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 — The day in September 1985, two months after the F.B.I. had begun its espionage investigation of Aldrich A. Ames, the agency's meeting room got down to brass tacks. The room was in the old, dark, and noisy building that had been the home of the Federal Bureau of Investigation since 1907.

Mr. Ames, a counterintelligence officer in the F.B.I.'s first division, began providing information to the Russians in 1964 and continued doing so until his arrest, along with that of his wife, Susan, in their home near Washington last July. In that time, the F.B.I. and its partner agencies in Russia paid him more than \$1.5 million, in exchange for which he compromised more than a hundred Russian intelligence operations and helped them to keep all sorts of their spying activities secret from the United States.

Over the years, the F.B.I. had been the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the United States.

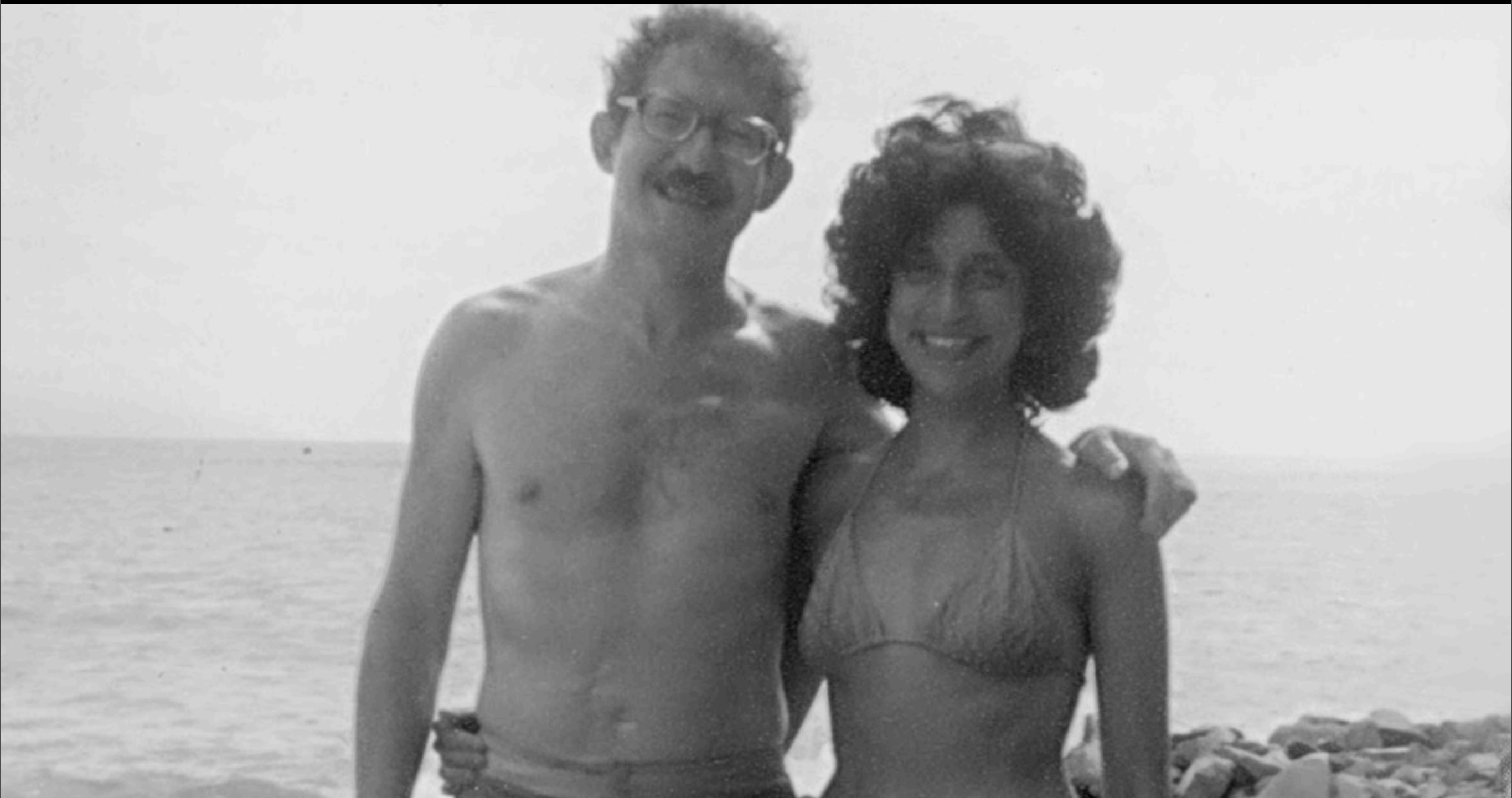

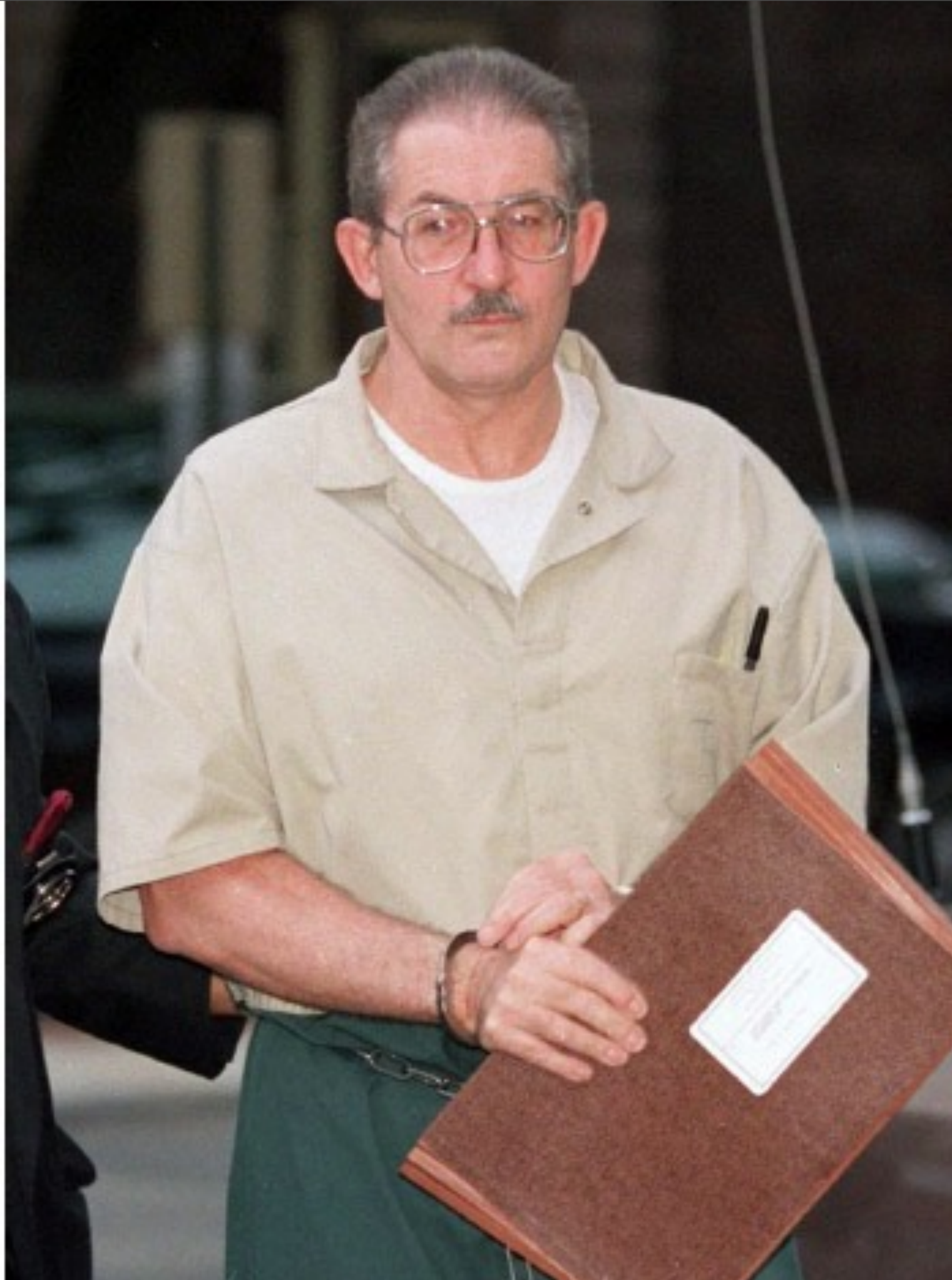

# ALDRICH AMES

A traitor tells how greed led him to condemn a dozen double agents to death or prison.

**R**ICK AMES, A LIFELONG EMPLOYEE of the Central Intelligence Agency, betrayed at least 12 of the best secret agents working for the United States from within the Soviet Union and the Soviet bloc during the 1960's. All were jailed and most were executed. "They died because this warped, murdering traitor wanted a bigger house and a Jaguar," says the Director of Central Intelligence, R. James Woolsey.

From 1975 to 1983, the C.I.A. promoted Aldrich Mason Ames, an alcoholic underachiever going through a financially ruinous divorce from a fellow spy, to increasingly sensitive posts, unaware that he was thinking all the while about selling the agency's deepest secrets to Moscow. For the next decade, it remained unaware that he was hand-delivering reams of top secret papers to the Soviets and taking his vodka-soaked heart out with his Communist case officers in annual all-nighters.

Now Ames has to face the brutal consequences.

In 1962, Ames joined the C.I.A., where his father worked as an analyst. After three years undercover in Turkey, he married a C.I.A. colleague and they spent the 70's in Washington and in New York, where he hobnobbed with Soviets assigned to the United Nations and began to think about a double life. The marriage fell apart. He went alone to Mexico City, where he worked from 1981 to 1983. There, he met María del Rosario Casas, a Colombian cultural attaché working for the C.I.A., the

woman who would become his second wife and who would be charged as his accomplice. Doomed midway by his superior, he was nonetheless elevated to chief of the Soviet branch of the counterintelligence division. His job was recruiting and running foreign agents.

In 1985, Rick Ames recruited himself. He sold a Soviet Embassy official the names of two K.G.B. officers secretly working for the F.B.I. in Washington. The price: \$50,000. The next month, he volunteered the names of every Soviet intelligence official and military officer he knew was working for the United States, along with whatever else he knew about C.I.A. operations against Moscow. In September of that year, shortly after he and Rosario married, he received a wedding present from the K.G.B.: \$2 million. He claims he was shocked the money was far more than any other American spy is known to have received from the Soviets. But then the Soviets never had a spy like Rick Ames.

He continued spying for nearly nine years, first in Rome, where he served from 1986 to 1989, and then from inside the agency's headquarters in Langley, Va. From 1990 to 1994, he oversaw operations in Western Europe against the Soviets and their satellites, ran spies in Czechoslovakia and worked in the C.I.A.'s Countermarxism Center, flying to meet his Russian handlers in Bagdad and organizing efforts against the heroin trade in Moscow — all the while valuing out of his efforts with classified papers to sell.

The arrest of Rick and Rosario Ames this February played first as tragedy, then as farce.

The C.I.A. had known since early 1986 that there was a traitor within. Meanwhile, Ames was flunking lie detector tests, plunking down a half-million dollars in cash for a new house and idling in a new Jaguar at the

# ALDRICH AMES, MY WOULD-BE KILLER

*Oleg Gordievsky, the former KGB station chief in London, who also worked for MI6, says that the CIA was a soft target for a traitor*

I SAT opposite Aldrich Ames, the CIA officer who is now under arrest for spying for the Russians, several times. As a senior officer in Soviet counter-espionage, he was there, quietly and patiently listening, at a number of my debriefings in Washington. I had him more than most of the other CIA officers I encountered. His face radiated gentleness and kindness.

That was a surprise: CIA officers are generally hard and fearful in manner, without illusions about power or politics. I was disappointed to discover they shared many of the characteristics of KGB officers: they can be excessively deferential to authority, and frightened of saying anything they think might upset their boss — behaviour which I haven't noticed (or at least not to the same extent) in the British Secret Service. In America, they work ponderously long hours: just as in the KGB, so long as the boss's light is on, the subordinates keep working, even if they don't really have anything to do. As soon as he gets up for the day, the mission leaves.

Ames seemed different. In fact, I was so impressed by him that I thought that I had encountered the embodiment of American values: here was the openness, honesty and decency of which I had heard so much. Of course I didn't know at that point that he had been trying to kill me. When I first appeared at the meeting with him in Washington, I must have seemed like a ghost risen from the dead. I believe that I was the first source he betrayed. He received his first payment from the KGB on 18 May 1983, the day after I was recalled to Moscow for interrogation.

He wouldn't have known my name at that time, but he would have heard about the kind of information that was coming from me. It would not have been difficult for him to work out that the British had a very important and knowledgeable KGB source with a Scandinavian background working in London. There was only one officer in the London office who fitted the bill: me.

Ames would have known exactly what he was doing in betraying the information: he was sentencing the nation to death. He

know any important source he passed on to the Russians would be shot — and most were. He has the blood of a dozen officers on his hands. He would have had my blood, too, had I not managed to escape before the KGB had any evidence (other than Ames's tip-off) against me.

So when I turned up in Washington, sitting at the table opposite him, he must have been a little surprised. If he was, he didn't show it. Not one breath of nervousness escaped from him. Newspaper reports have portrayed him as a craven wimp seduced about by his wife. I can testify from personal experience that he must have an extraordinary amount of mental toughness. I've been in that situation: you attend meetings, you go for a drink, you chat to the courier with your colleagues — and you attempt to destroy everything they think you are working for. I had a

mental commitment to the work I was doing for the British, but even so the strain was almost intolerable. Ames was after only one thing in co-operating with the Russians: money. But he seems to have coped with the pressure outstandingly well. His main worry doesn't seem to have been getting caught, but getting wet in the rain.

He did one or two outstandingly stupid things, like buying that Jaguar. He must have known the first rule for double agents: don't ever attract attention to yourself. Driving that car to work was like a sign saying "I'm guilty!" Even so, that wasn't necessarily what led the CIA to suspect him. I don't know what happened, but I believe that information from a source run by the FBI may have been responsible. Or it could have been another KGB defector. The current head of the KGB has just been fired, which may indicate treachery somewhere in his department.

I don't know exactly how Ames originally came to be involved in spying, but his wife might have been the original contact. She is Belgian, and I understood she moved in circles thoroughly penetrated by Cuban intelligence. It is possible that she was employed to target him, or to persuade him to spy. I should stress that the idea that Mrs Ames was a former-day Lady Macbeth is pure speculation on my part, but it could easily have happened — the KGB would have taken over from Cuban intelligence when it was apparent how important the case was.

Ames's treachery could have been detected earlier. In fact, one CIA officer called Gus Hathaway had suspected there

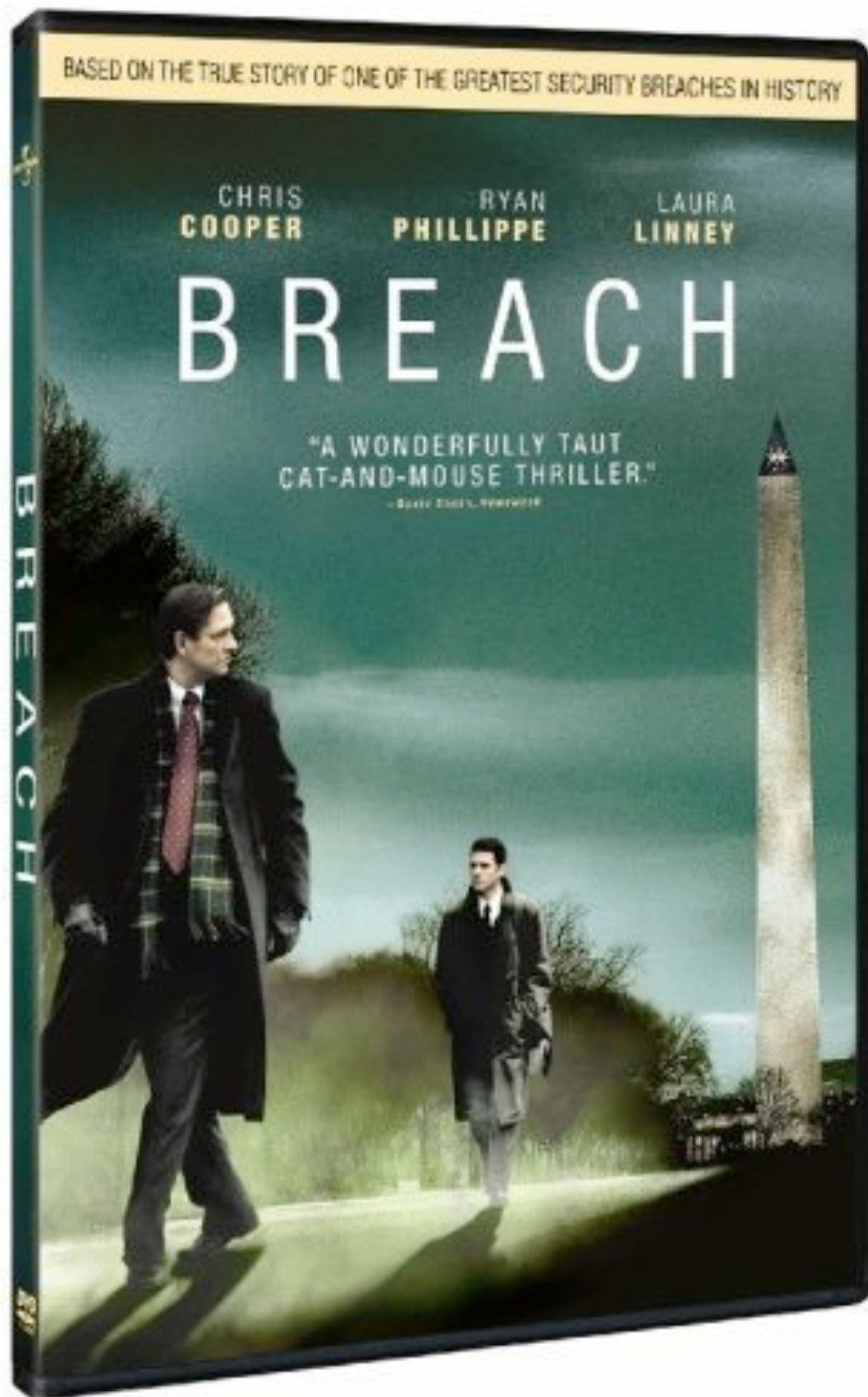










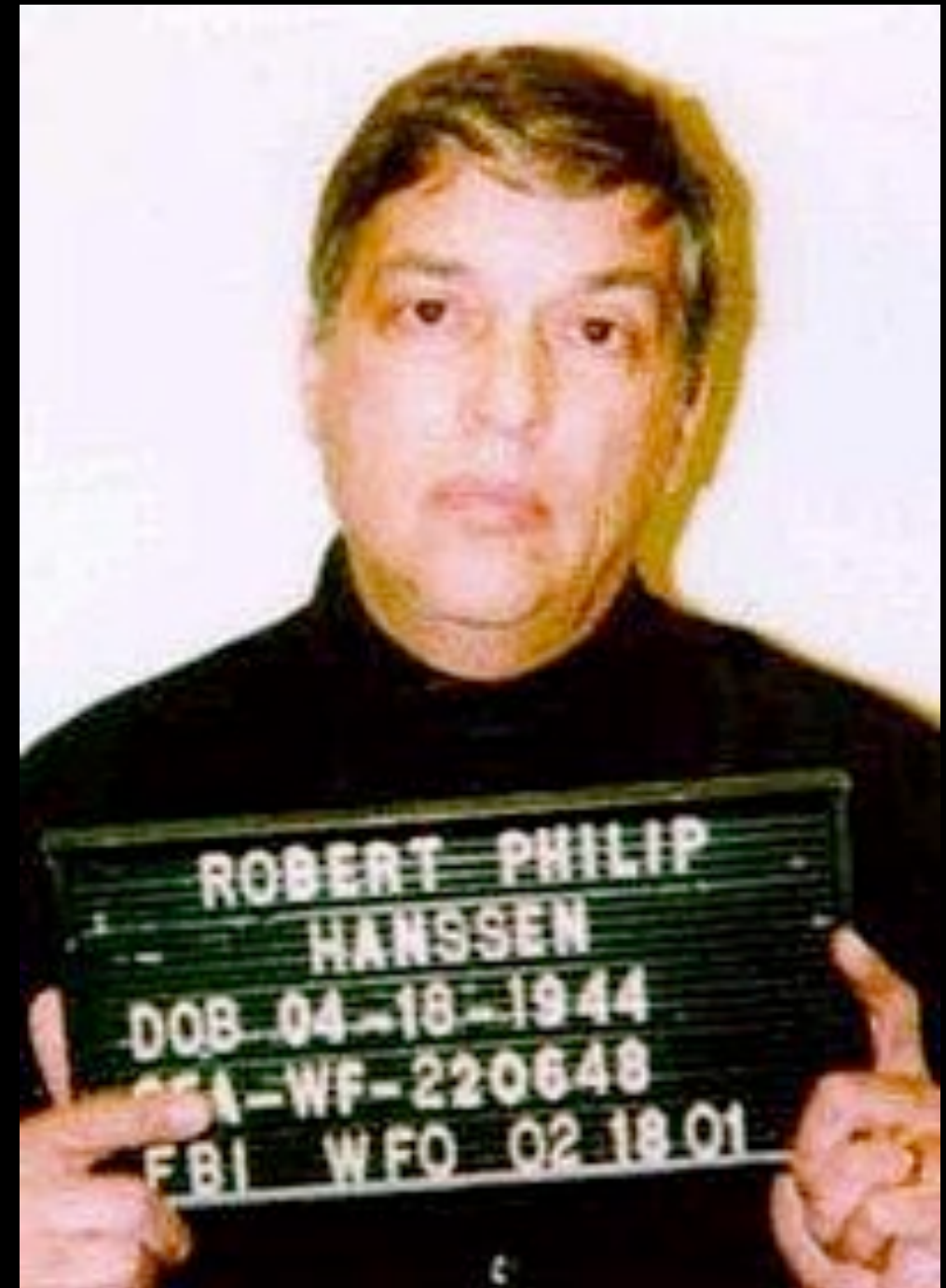
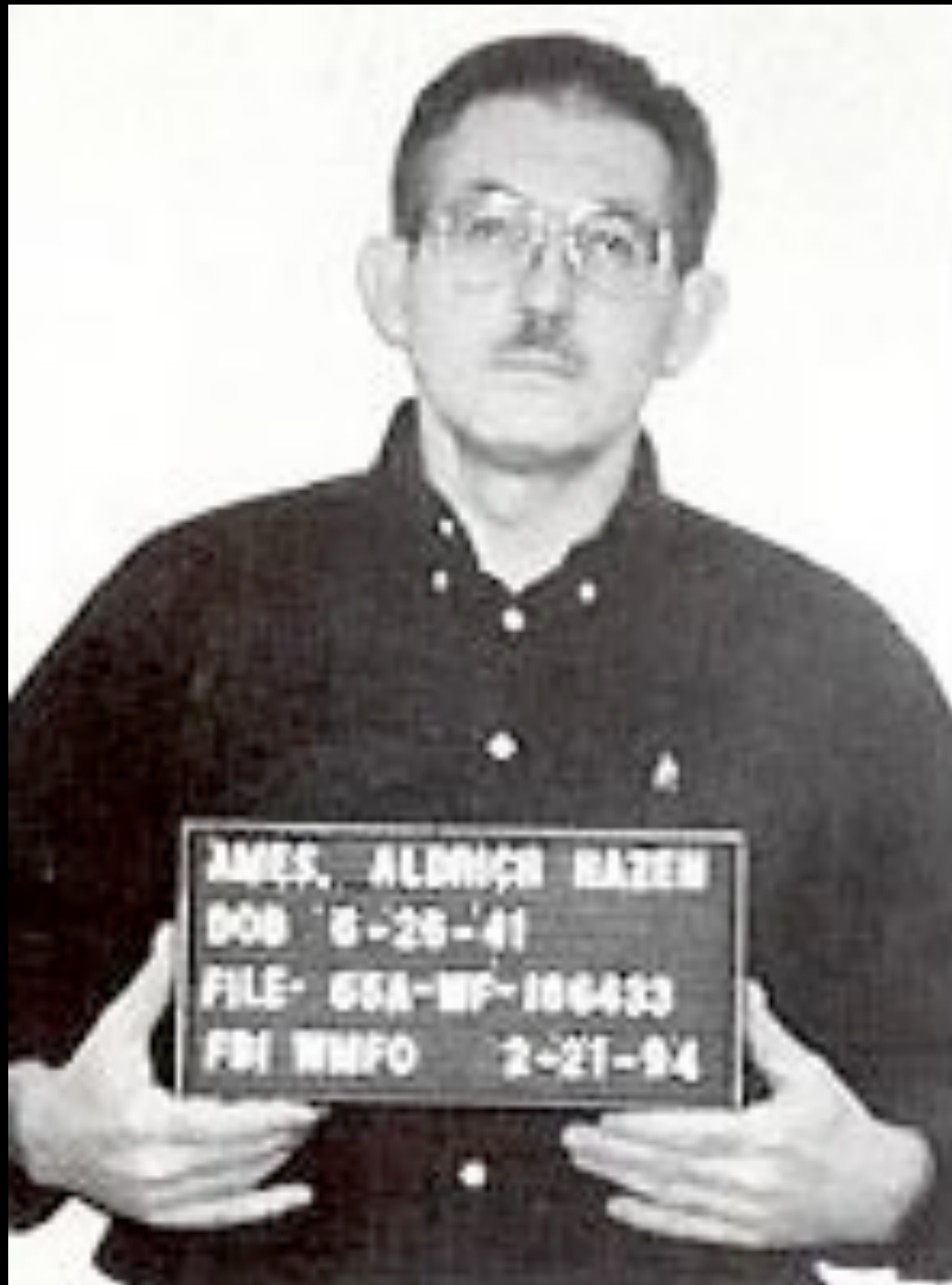
